

Planned Use of Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) 2015-2016



In 2015-2016, Meldreth Primary will be allocated £45,620 of funding to support pupils who are eligible for pupil premium grant (PPG).

We intend to use this to support our children with high quality teaching and training for teachers, priority reading support and small group and individual pre and post teaching to support pupils in their academic development.

We also run a variety of interventions across the school to support pupil's social skills and their wellbeing, this includes funding for class outings, residential visits and supporting the cost of access to wrap around care including breakfast club.

In addition to the focused teaching interventions provided to pupils listed here, we also use teaching approaches which close the gap in attainment outlined below.

Summary of PPG spending 2015/16

Objectives in spending PPG:

Raising Attainment and achievement of students to at least expected progress through:

- Provision to raise literacy and numeracy levels. English and Mathematics support to personalise learning and raise outcomes for pupils e.g. 1:1 tuition
- Providing social and emotional support/interventions to improve attendance and behaviour
- Enhanced/improved cultural capital – trips, activities, extra curriculum activities and support with uniform, materials etc.

Summary of planned spending:

- Spirals club (Social, communication & interaction support) – Early Years
- Nurture Club(Owls) for Y1 - 4
- Better Reading Partnerships (intense daily reading support) - Year 1
- Individual or small group additional tuition for children
- First Class at maths – Year 3/4
- Change 4 life club (social, behaviour, attendance and attainment support through physical activity) – Y4-6
- Inference Training – Year 5/6
- Individual and group interventions run across the school in classes for EYFS – Y6 in classes
- Individual counselling
- Extended Schools Subsidy

Expected Outcomes:

- Progress for all pupils in literacy and numeracy
- Expected Progress VA and % of pupils making expected progress in English and Maths for pupil premium cohort is higher than national average for similar students.
- Lesson observations and work scrutiny shows improved learning behaviour
- Pupils are able to access high quality extra-curricular provision including clubs, breakfast and after school care and residential visits.
